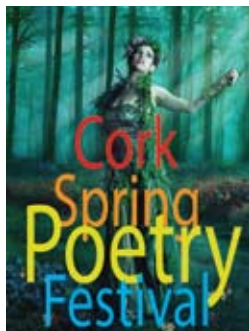

The Munster Literature Centre/Ionad Litríochta an Deiscirt has been hosting spring literary festivals in Cork since the mid nineties. Last year in recognition of the central position of poetry in Cork's contemporary literary life we decided to make the festival exclusively poetry.

The Munster Literature Centre/Ionad Litríochta an Deiscirt and the Cork Spring Poetry Festival is proud to be a part of these celebrations.

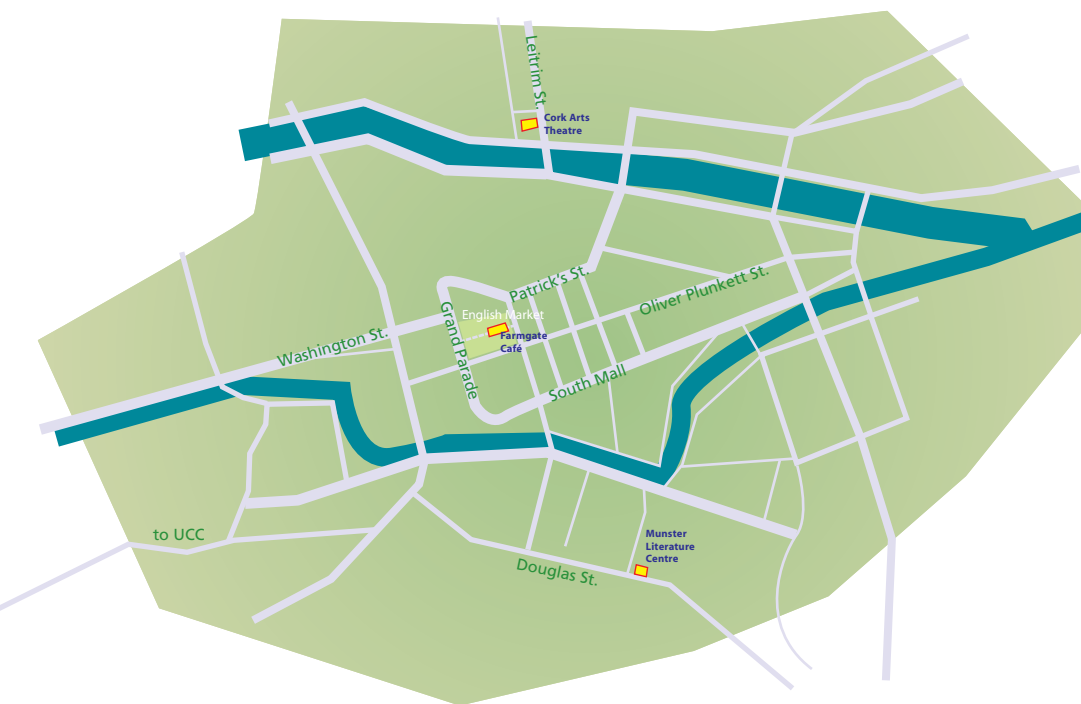

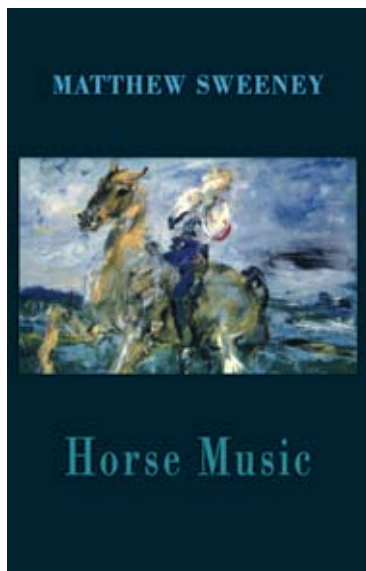
Matthew Sweeney Book Launch

Matthew Sweeney was born in Lifford, Co. Donegal, Ireland in 1952. He moved to London in 1973 and studied at the Polytechnic of North London and the University of Freiburg. After living in Berlin and Timișoara for some years, he returned to Ireland and now lives in Cork where he is currently writer-in-residence at University College Cork.

Matthew Sweeney's tenth collection of poems is as sinister as its dark forebears, but the notes he hits in Horse Music are lyrical and touching as well as disturbing and disquieting. Confronting him in these imaginative riffs are not just the perplexing animals and folklorish crows familiar from his earlier books, but also magical horses, ghosts, dwarves and gnomes.

Paul Casey grew up between Ireland and Africa. He has worked mostly in multimedia, teaching and film. He taught screenwriting at the Nelson Mandela University, and convened the Greater Port Elizabeth Poetry Competition. His poems are published in Ireland, South Africa, the US and China. His chapbook *It's Not all Bad* (Heaventree Press) was published in 2009. In 2010 his poetry-film *The Lammas Hireling* (after Ian Duhig), premiered in Berlin. His collection *home more or less* was published by Salmon Poetry in 2012. He is the founder / organiser of the Ó Bhéal reading series in his home city, Cork.

Kathy D'Arcy published a chapbook, *Encounter*, with Lapwing in 2010. She has worked as a doctor and teacher, and is currently involved in working with homeless teenagers in Cork. D'Arcy runs writing courses for people of all ages and abilities with UCC CACE, and teaches on the MA in Women's Studies there. The poetry ensemble of which she is a member, Catch the Moon, has performed at literary festivals around the country. She is currently writer in residence with Tigh Fíli. Her first full-length collection, *The Wild Pupil* (Bradshaw), was published in 2012.





Afric McGlinchey grew up in Ireland and Africa. Her work has appeared in *The SHOp*, *Southword*, *Poetry Ireland Review*, *Northern Liberties Review* (USA), *Tears in the Fence* (UK), *Acumen* (UK), *Magma* (UK), *The English Leaving Certificate Examinations Book 2012*, and other journals. A Pushcart nominee and a Hennessy Poetry Award winner, she was also highly commended in the Magma and Dromineer poetry competitions in 2012. She is a freelance book editor and reviewer, and tutors poetry online at www.africmcglinchey.com. Her debut collection, *The Lucky Star of Hidden Things*, was published in 2012 by Salmon. Afric lives in West Cork.

Margy Noonan lives in Cork, where she works as a lecturer in French literature at University College Cork. Her poems have appeared in *The Dark Horse*, *The Stinging Fly*, *Southword*, *The SHOp*, *Cyphers*, *Blackbox Manifold*, *BigCityLit*, *Wasafiri*, *Tears in the Fence*, *The Moth*, *The Echo Room*, *The Same*, *The Cork Literary Review*, *The Alhambra Poetry Calendar 2010*, *Best of Irish Poetry 2010*, and *The Threepenny Review* (Summer 2012). She won the Listowel Poetry Collection Prize in 2010. Her first collection – *The Fado House* – was published by Dedalus Press, Dublin (www.dedaluspress.com) in 2012. 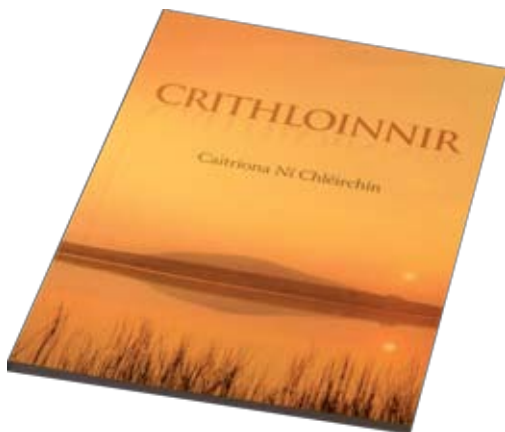

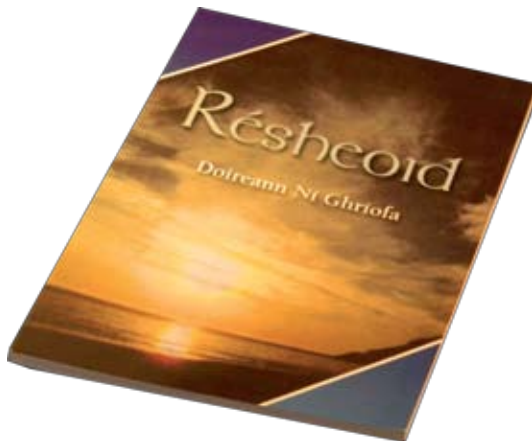

John Ennis born Westmeath. He has published over a dozen collections and won numerous prizes including the Listowel Poetry Prize eleven times, the Patrick Kavanagh Award (1975) and the Irish American Cultural Institute Award (1996). He has been editor of Poetry Ireland Review and served on the board of Poetry Ireland for eleven years. From 2003 to 2007, he co-edited three anthologies of Canadian – Irish Poetry. In 2008, Memorial University awarded him an Honorary Doctorate in Laws “[for] fostering links between Ireland and Newfoundland, and for his poetry”.

Seán Lysaght was born in Cork in 1957 and raised in Limerick. He is currently a lecturer in Heritage Studies at GMIT, Castlebar. His first collection of poems, *Noah's Irish Ark* was published by Dedalus in 1989. He has since published six books with Gallery Press, including translations of Goethe's *Venetian Epigrams* (2008) and *Selected Poems* (2010). He has also written a biography of the naturalist Robert Lloyd Praeger (Four Courts, 1998) and a verse narrative of the life of Edmund Spenser (Stonechat Editions, 2011). In 2007 he was the recipient of the Lawrence O'Shaughnessy Poetry Award.

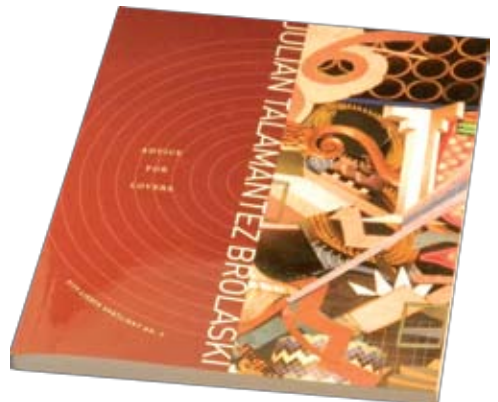
Julian Talamantez Brolaski & Triin Soomets

Julian Talamantez Brolaski is the author of *Advice for Lovers* (City Lights, 2012), *gowanus atropolis* (Ugly Duckling Presse, 2011) and co-editor of *NO GENDER: Reflections on the Life & Work of kari edwards* (Litmus Press / Belladonna Books 2009). Julian lives in Brooklyn where he is an editor at Litmus Press and plays country music with Juan & the Pines. Brolaski's work often explores transgender and gender-variant experiences through linguistics experimentation, including the use of gender-neutral pronouns, etymology, and alternative spelling.

Triin Soomets was born in Tallinn, Estonia in 1969. She graduated as a philologist from Tartu University in 1994. Since 1991 she has published eight collections of poetry and has won many of Estonia's leading poetry prizes including the Ivar Ivask Memorial Prize and Juhan Liiv annual prize of poetry (twice). Her poems have been translated into over twenty languages.

Edith Piaf was one of France's most beloved singers, and became a national icon. Her singing reflected her tragic life, with her specialty being the poignant ballad performed in a heartbreaking voice. **Jacques Brel**, born in Belgium, composed and performed songs charged with poetry and drama.

Non, je ne regrette rien: Tionscadal Piaf-Brel features songs by Edith Piaf and Jacques Brel rendered into exquisite Irish by **Liam Ó Muirthile**. They are performed by singers **Hilary Bow** - whose album *Oneness* was acclaimed by Eamon Carr as 'one of the most captivating Irish albums of the year' - and **Doimnic Mac Giolla Bhríde**, whose work has been praised by the *Minnesota Irish Gazette* as 'pure magic, rich with mirth, mischief, and melancholy'. Accompanying them are **Peter Roycroft** on piano; **Geoff Kirk** on drums; and **Neville Lloyd** on double-bass. Designer **Margaret Lonergan** has created special on-screen projections of the lyrics accompanied by images inspired by the songs. Liam Ó Muirthile will also read new versions in Irish of poems by **Jacques Prévert** and **Paul Verlaine**.

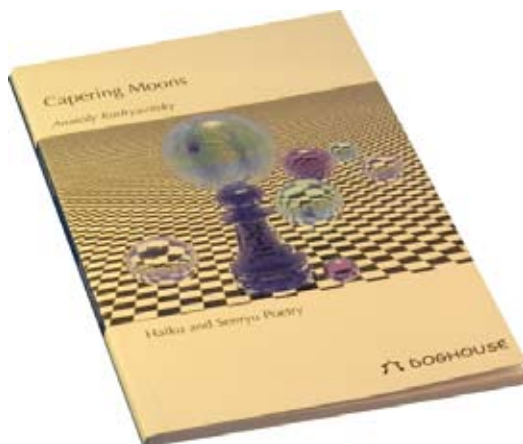
Anatoly Kudryavitsky & Gerry Murphy

Anatoly Kudryavitsky is a Russian/Irish writer of Polish/Irish extraction. He has published two novels, a few novellas and short stories, seven books of his Russian poems and three collections of his English poems, *Shadow of Time* (Goldsmith, 2005), *Morning at Mount Ring* and *Capering Moons* (Doghouse, 2007 and 2011), as well as *A Night in the Nabokov Hotel*, an anthology of contemporary Russian poetry in English translation (Dedalus, 2006) and *Bamboo Dreams*, an anthology of Irish haiku (Doghouse, 2012). He lives in Co. Dublin and edits *Shamrock Haiku Journal*. His poems have been translated into twelve languages.

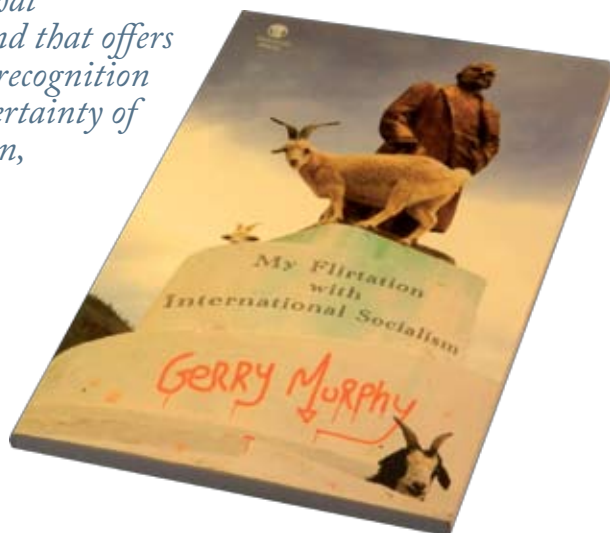

Gerry Murphy was born in Cork in 1952. He has published seven collections of poetry, including *End of Part One: New and Selected Poems* (2006) and *My Flirtation with International Socialism* (2010). In 2008 his work was adapted for actors and musicians by Crazy Dog Audio Theatre as *The People's Republic of Gerry Murphy*. He also published a volume of versions of the Polish poet Katarzyna Borun-Jagodzinska (2005).

John F. Deane born on Achill Island in 1943. He founded Poetry Ireland and Poetry Ireland Review in 1979. He is the author of many collections of poetry and some fiction. His poetry has been published in French, Bulgarian, Romanian, Italian and Swedish translations. He has been Secretary-General of the European Academy of Poetry. Among his awards are the O'Shaughnessy Award for Irish Poetry, the Grand International Prize for Poetry from Romania and the Marten Toonder Award for Literature. His poems in Italian, translated by Roberto Cogo, won the 2002 Premio Internazionale di Poesia Città di Marinese for the best foreign poetry of the year. John F. Deane is a member of Aosdána.

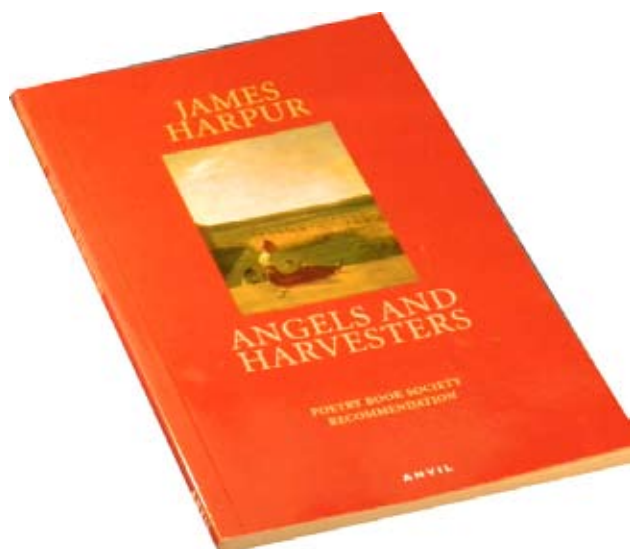

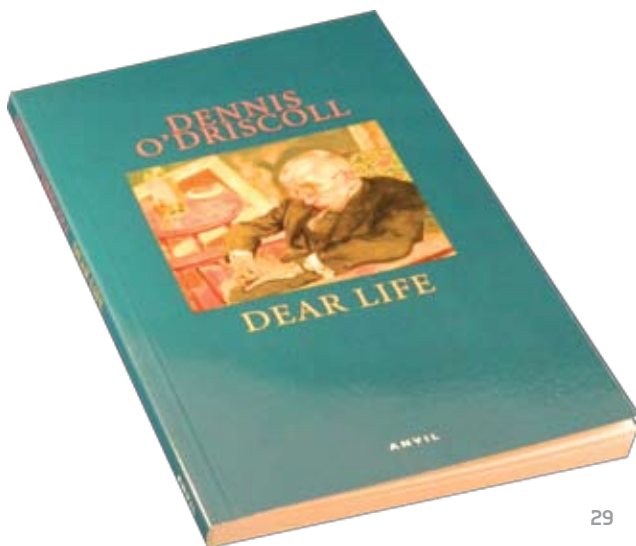

Carolyn Forché was born in Detroit, Michigan in 1950. Her first collection, *Gathering the Tribes* (1976), was selected for the Yale Series of Younger Poets by Stanley Kunitz. Her second book, *The Country Between Us* (1981), drew on her experiences in El Salvador during the civil war, and won the Poetry Society of America's Alice Fay di Castagnola Award, and was the Lamont Poetry Selection of the Academy of American Poets. Her later collections include: *The Angel of History* (Bloodaxe, 1994), *Blue Hour* (Bloodaxe, 2003), and *In the Lateness of the World* (Bloodaxe 2013).

Bring pen & paper!



One of the things a great poem can do is to generate a feeling of deep recognition in its readers. An encounter with something that reorients our attention, that surprises us with its strange accuracy, that feels intuitively “true” in a way that may not have anything to do with fact or conventional meaning. It might lie in an unexpectedly apt metaphor or in how a detail suddenly emerges as significant in a sense larger than its particular context. Or it can be more difficult to pin down, or categorize. It might be ambiguous, haunting, or weird. In any case, these encounters are among the things that stick with us in a poem, that make the world seem just a little different, having read it. But how does one achieve this kind of immediacy as a writer? How do we create poems that aren’t simply something told to a reader, second-hand stories or impressions of what has happened, but that, themselves, happen on the page? How do we create poems that are first-hand experiences for readers? This talk hopes to address some of these questions – though not to answer them – using examples from a handful of the world’s best poets and with a few possible ways we might get the beginnings of a poem on the page.

Håkan Sandell was born in Malmö in southern Sweden in 1962, and is today living in Oslo. He published his first long-poem at age 19, and has since published about 20 collections and selections of his poetry. Translated collections exist in German and Hungarian, and an English translation is scheduled to be published soon in the USA. Sandell resided for a year in Ireland in the mid 90s and has written about Ireland. He has also enjoyed longer stays in London and Berlin and lived for many years in Copenhagen. Among his main themes are love and religion, set in contemporary urban environments. His poetry is often more epic than lyrical or perhaps narrative-lyrical. He makes use of classical forms as well as folk verse patterns and modernism.

Shternberg is also a prolific translator of poetry, specialising in Irish and English Poetry. He has published selections of Patrick Kavanagh and Eavan Boland's poems, and his work includes a manuscript of Seamus Heaney's selected poems and essays.

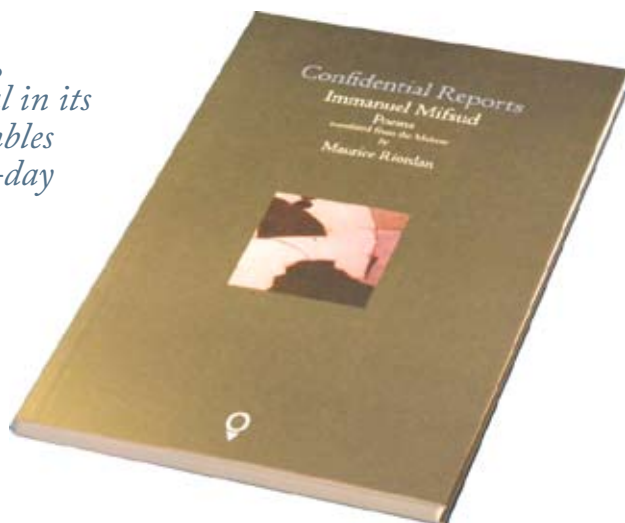
Immanuel Mifsud & Tomaž Šalamun

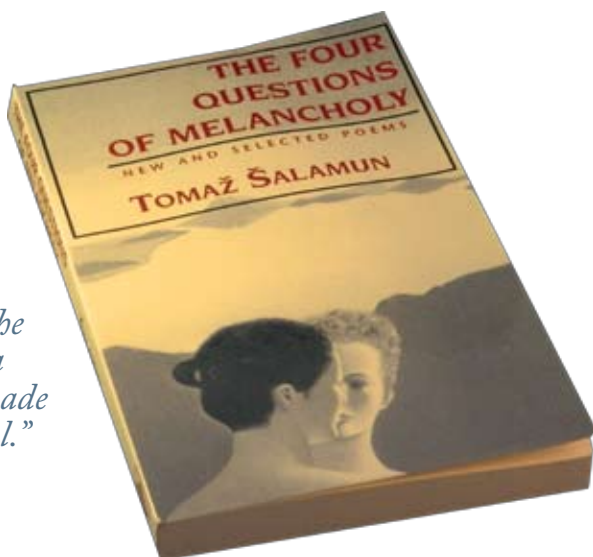

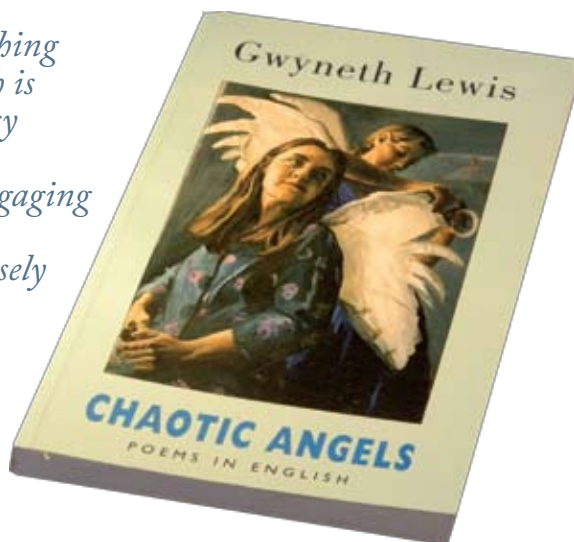

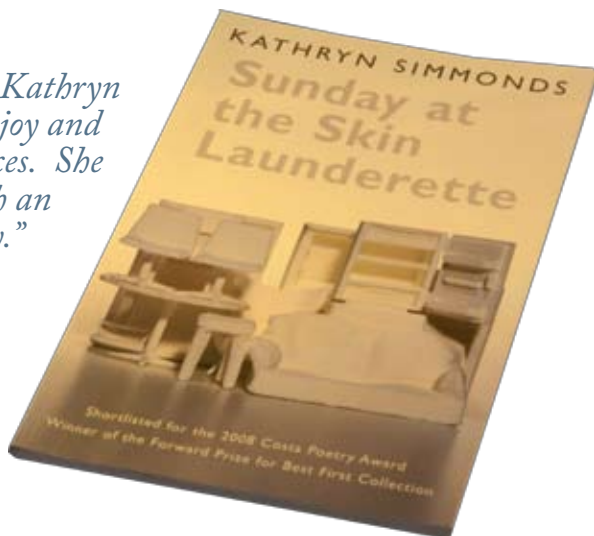

Wednesday: Haiku Workshop with Anatoly Kudryavitsky €35

What does it take to write a perfect haiku? The technique is easy to master, so newcomers usually come up with good poems towards the end of a haiku workshop. The main thing is the ability to observe nature and to collect visual images, sometimes unusual or even weird. We'll look at possible techniques of haiku writing concentrating on the usual "dos" and "don'ts". We'll also compare classical Japanese haiku and related forms with the works of contemporary masters of the genre. The haiku workshop is aimed at all levels, and participants are welcome to bring their haiku or haiku drafts.

Thursday: The Male Muse with Eduardo C. Corral €35

Participants in this workshop will write poems inspired by a male muse. Class discussion and instructor feedback will guide the writing process, from drafting to revision. As we draft and revise poems, we'll play close attention to the line. We'll examine how diction and syntax enrich and enlarge a line of verse. In addition, we'll read and discuss contemporary poems written by gay and straight poets informed by a queer gaze that idealizes the male body. This will be a safe and supportive environment.

Friday: Masterclass with Gwyneth Lewis €50

This workshop is limited to people with at least two magazine publication credits. In her workshop, Gwyneth Lewis will divide the time between a period of instruction and on-the-spot writing exercises.

Saturday: Masterclass with Carolyn Forché €50

This workshop is limited to people with at least two magazine publication credits. In her workshop, Carolyn Forché will present her method for approaching writing and revision, and will offer critiques of poems from each participant during the three-hour session.

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
